A POSITIVE APPROACH TO ASTHMA

Cheswardine Primary School welcomes pupils with asthma. They are encouraged to take full part in all activities of the school. Cheswardine Primary School has adopted The Policy and Guidance for The Management of Asthma in Schools in Shropshire and Telford & Wrekin.

ASTHMA EDUCATION

Monitor: Headteacher

All staff are advised on practical asthma management. They are familiar with all types of inhaler and have had training in their use and how they should be used effectively. Close contact is maintained with the School Nurse who is involved in the Asthma Education in the school, and we ask her for guidance when it is needed. Mandy Blank and Sally Whitehouse are the named Asthma practitioners.

PARENTS

On entry to the school, parents are asked whether their child suffers from asthma. Parents of children who may require inhalers, during the school day, are requested to have a spare inhaler, which may be kept at school. The same applies to preventer inhalers. Parents are requested to complete the medical form detailed at 5;2:7 of the Shropshire County Council Health and Safety disk.

Parents are contacted when a pupil requests frequent use of their inhaler. Parents should regularly check to see if an inhaler is running out.

ACCESS TO INHALERS

Inhalers are to be kept in the child's classroom. The School Secretary will ask parents to complete the appropriate forms stating when medication should be given. A record is kept of all inhalers kept in school, along with a record of the date and time any inhalers have been administered. Children will keep one inhaler with them.

The school ensures that there is access to reliever inhalers at all times; in the classroom, on the sports field, at break, at lunchtimes and on school trips.

SPORTS

The aim of total normal activity should be the goal for all but the most severely affected pupil with asthma. However, nearly all young people with asthma can become wheezy during exercise.

Children who have exercise induced asthma will be given an opportunity to take a puff of their inhaler before they start that exercise. Teachers will be made aware that some children are shy of doing this in public.

Pupils who are normally active will not be forced to participate in PE if they say they are too wheezy to continue.

PASSIVE SMOKING

The Governors have declared the school and its grounds as a 'No Smoking' area, therefore pupils are not exposed to this hazard.

NEBULISERS

Where a pupil has to use a Nebuliser to deliver drugs, the school will liaise with the GP/Nurse on the correct management.

IN THE CASE OF AN ASTHMA ATTACK

Staff members dealing with a child who is having an asthma attack will not limit their use of their reliever medication - you cannot overdose on an inhaler.

Children should be sat on a chair and should not be crowded by others. A firstaider must be contacted immediately, who will then decide to contact the emergency services if required.
