Using Subordinate Clauses

A simple sentence has one main clause. Such as:

The dog growled at the cat.

When you add a subordinate clause, you are forming a complex sentence. The subordinate clause gives us some extra information but could not be a sentence on its own without the main clause, as it does not make sense on its own.

The subordinate clause does not have to be in the middle of the sentence. When I grow up, I want to be a vet. The children always work hard, especially in English.
