Contractor s Including clinically vulnerable and clinically extremely vulnerable	•	Wearing a face covering or face mask in schools or other education settings is not recommended in class, but is presently expected in communal areas and corridors. Staff and children may arrive at school having worn a face covering on public transport or through choice. School should therefore know the process of correct removal when they arrive at school: don't touch the front of the covering, wash hands, remove into a lidded bin or plastic bag to take home, wash hands again. Schools and other education or childcare settings should not require staff, children and learners to wear face coverings in class. Changing habits, cleaning and hygiene are effective measures in controlling the spread of the virus. Staff do not need to wear face coverings in class, whilst teaching, however these may well be reintroduced if restrictions return. Face coverings (or any form of medical mask where instructed to be used for specific clinical reasons) should not be worn in any circumstance by those who may not be able to handle them as directed (for example, young children, or those with special educational needs or disabilities) as it may inadvertently increase the risk of transmission. In Cheswardine advice is that staff do not wear masks due to the specific needs of one KS1 child in particular. Alternative see through masks are available to use.
The majority of staff in education settings will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work. PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases including:
children, young people and students whose care routinely already involves the use of PPE due to their intimate care needs should continue to receive their care in the same way – all children in Nursery when intimate care is required if a child, young person or other learner becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus while in the setting and needs direct personal care until they can return home. A fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained. If contact with the child or young person is necessary, then disposable gloves, a disposable apron and a fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult. If a risk assessment determines that there is a risk of splashing to the eyes, for example from coughing, spitting, or vomiting, then eye protection should also be worn. PPE is available in the staffroom to use in these situations when the child should be moved to the reception area and the door opened. Packs of PPE are available in every bubble and in the staff room when required.

- Additional Risk Assessment is in place for EHCP pupil.
- Continue monitoring and review risk assessments and other health and safety advice for children, young people and staff in light of recent government or local health authority advice, identifying protective measures (such as the things listed above)

Communication to all parties is essential:

- tell children, young people, parents, carers or any visitors, such as suppliers, not to enter the education or childcare setting if they are displaying any symptoms of coronavirus. Use warn and inform letters whenever cases are confirmed.
- Make clear to all that restrictions may be reintroduced if national or local outbreaks occur and general community or national restrictions are put in place.
- Parents have been directed to resources such as <u>e-bug</u> and PHE schools resources.
- ensure parents and young people are aware of recommendations on transport to and from education or childcare setting (including avoiding peak times). Read the COVID-19): safer travel guidance for passengers
- talk to staff about the plans
- communicate early with contractors and suppliers that will need to prepare to support your plans for opening for example, cleaning, catering, food supplies, hygiene suppliers.
